#### Talking to Our Children about Difficult Subjects

As Christian parents, grandparents, Aunts and Uncles, as families of faith, how do we talk to our children about the carnage and chaos, the broken places in our world created by human hands and human hearts? How do we discuss all that is in the daily news that is ongoing? Especially all that is happening in Ukraine and is now erupting in the Holy Land now? These are hard topics. I feel first we must know the facts and what is true so that we can choose what to share in appropriate ways and suitable language with our children. As you learn, remember these three points:

- 1. At their heart, the conflicts are political in nature, not religious. Before the middle of the 20th century, Muslims, Christians and Jews (all Arabs, all Semitic peoples) lived in mutual respect and support for each other. They shared (and still do!) a culture, language and life, and the same God.
- 2. In situations like Ukraine and the Middle East the people in power usually control the narrative, therefore that is the story that gets told globally about what's happening on the ground.
- 3. The Gospel teaches us in order to hear the full story, we have to pay attention and also listen to the powerless, the dispossessed and the oppressed. In the end, talking with our kids about this topic is the same as talking about any other topic: stick to the truth. Which aspects of the truth we choose to tell depends, of course, on the age of the child. But we always tell them what is true, and I have found that a child of nearly any age understands and knows instinctively and profoundly this sad truth: Hurt people hurt people. Sadly I don't know how and why but even the youngest child reacts that when one feels hurt, our first instinct sadly is often to hurt back. Someone takes your turn on the swing? You might be inclined to push them off. Someone calls you a bad name? You start thinking of a worse one to hurl back. And if you can't unleash your pain back onto the person who harmed you, you might find it directed somewhere else maybe even onto someone else entirely, unfairly. Hurt people hurt people...

As parents, our job is to help our children to learn how to control those instincts, to talk through the pain someone has caused us, to use our words, to practice forgiveness. But we know how hard it is to do any of these thing at every age. But as followers of Jesus, we know there is another way. We are taught to love our neighbors. We have been shown by Jesus how it is possible to stop the cycle of pain and hurt, to forgive, to move forward with mercy, love and compassion, to turn the other cheek, not as a passive victim but as a radical and courageous act of love.

We know it is not easy to offer kindness and love, we know we will often fail, but as Joshua in the Old Testament declared: "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord'. May we all continue to practice Christ's Way. We can pray together that one day there be leaders in the Holy Land who are committed to creating for all a courageous life of tolerance, generosity, kindness and forgiveness.



November is a month traditionally where we have a celebration of gratitude, a day called Thanksgiving. Oftentimes, we think of Thanksgiving as one day—a time to gather family around the table, to lay out a Thanksgiving feast (don't forget the pies!), and to give thanks for our many blessings. But when reading the Bible, every day is a day of thanksgiving. There are 19 thanksgiving Psalms, the phrase give thanks appears 37 times in Scripture, the word thanksgiving 35 times and gratitude 157 times. Henry Van Dyke said, "Gratitude is the inward feeling of kindness received. Thankfulness is the natural impulse to express that feeling. Thanksgiving is the following of that impulse." Over the years, I have learned quite a bit about the science and psychology of giving thanks. When we think about the gifts that surround us — provision, love, support, the wonders of nature — we refocus and reframe our experiences. We literally learn to *see* the world differently. But not in a kind of Pollyanna-ish, denial way. Rather, gratitude gives us a wider lens, one that allows for deeper dimensionality and realistic color, that enables us to draw previously invisible meaning and purpose from life and opens us to possibilities of hope and compassion we didn't know we had.

The word gratitude is derived from the Latin word gratia, which means grace, graciousness, or gratefulness (depending on the context). In some ways, gratitude encompasses all of these meanings. Gratitude isn't magic, but its benefits are enormous. There are numerous studies on how practicing gratitude benefits well-being, physical health, and fosters community. According to the Harvard Medical School gratitude is strongly and consistently associated with greater happiness. Gratitude helps people feel more positive emotions, relish good experiences, improve their health, deal with adversity, and build strong relationships. To quote Brother Steindhl Rast, "It is not joy that makes us grateful; it is gratitude that makes us joyful."

At FCC Hanover, November is also a month when the congregation shows their gratitude and thankfulness by offering one's time, talent and treasure during the church's stewardship campaign. Stewardship entails a process of continually renewing and recommitting oneself to God. By incorporating moments of daily gratitude, we are reminded of the spiritual dimension of our existence amidst the bustle of daily life. It is a way of reorienting ourselves, re-centering our focus towards the eternal and divine amidst the transient and mundane. "To be grateful is to recognize the love of God in everything." ~Thomas Merton

Psalm 28:7 offers this wisdom, "You will be enriched in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God." May it be so....
